I am forwarding to you for your information a 2014 CALEA assessment report. This report granted us our original CALEA certification. I have also enclosed our recertification report from 2017. Both reports indicate that the most important issue facing the Maplewood police department is adequate number of police officers. I have also enclosed a 4-year summary of police reports written by the Maplewood police department and surrounding departments and calls for service received by the Maplewood police department and surrounding departments. Finally, I have attached a Walmart retail theft calls for service report for the last 3 years.

Each of you already know my position in that I believe the hiring of 2 additional police officers is critical for the safety of our citizens and our police officers. While citizens feel they are safe in this community, we also have to be sure visitors to this community also feel safe. The majority of visitors to our community are coming here to shop at our businesses. The last thing we want to see happen is Maplewood return to how people perceived the community 15-20 years ago as an unsafe place.

The issue of training came up in the budget discussion. I am not opposed to additional training but I don't think anybody understands the amount of training our police department undertakes regularly. Part of CALEA certification requires constant training and I believe at this time, there are only 11 CALEA certified departments in St. Louis and St. Louis County. One of the reasons, besides having to meet stringent requirements, is the amount of training each officer must go through on a yearly basis.

From January 1, 2017, to present, Maplewood police officers have collectively undergone approximately 2,400 hours of continuing education training in Legal Studies, Technical Studies, Interpersonal Studies and Firearms/Skill Development.

The training curriculum Includes, but is not limited to:

Citizen Contacts & Bias Based Motor Vehicle Stops

Fair & Impartial Policing Practices with Impact Bias Recognition

Officer Well-Being & Mental Health Awareness

Handling Persons with Mental Health Cognitive Impairment Issues, and

Tactical Training, which includes De-escalation Techniques, Crisis Management, Critical Thinking, and Social Intelligence.

For your information I am attaching a short survey of how other cities are spending Prop P Funds.
